Terms and conditions of participation

Selection

1. Participation is only open to judges, prosecutors, court staff and lawyers in private practice from eligible EU Member States participating in the EU Justice Programme (Denmark does not participate) including Albania, Bosnia and Herzegovina, Kosovo* and Ukraine (*this designation is without prejudice to positions on status and is in line with UNSCR 1244/1999 and the ICJ opinion on the Kosovo declaration of independence).

The number of places available is limited (30 places). Participation will be subject to a selection procedure. Selection will be first come first served and according to nationality. Spanish applicants who work for the prosecution service must apply for this event through CEJ.

- 2. Applications should be submitted before 28 November 2024.
- A response will be sent to every applicant after this deadline. We advise you not to book any travel before you receive our confirmation.

Registration Fee

4. €135 including documentation, coffee breaks, lunches and dinner.

Travel and accommodation expenses

- 5. Participants will receive a fixed contribution towards their travel expenses and are asked to book their own travel. The condition for payment of this contribution is to sign all attendance sheets at the event. No supporting documents are needed. The amount of the contribution is determined by the EU unit cost calculation guidelines, which are based on the distance from the participant's place of work to the seminar location and do not take account of the participant's actual travel costs.
- 6. Travel costs from outside Romania: participants can calculate the contribution to which they will be entitled on the European Commission website (https://era-comm.eu/go/calculator). The distance is calculated from their place of work to the seminar location.
